## **Story Elements**

- **TEXT**: Gen. 22:1-19
- **Setting**: circa 1900 B.C. near Mt. Moriah
- Characters: God, Abram, & Isaac

## **Proving Faith**

1)	(vv 1-2) God had promised Abraham a son through his wife Sarah; was that promised child.		
	a) Although Abraham had other sons, Isaac was his only son in the sense that he was the only one that mattered in relation to God's covenant with Abraham. Isaac was the only "" child.		
	b) The term "only son" when applied to Isaac is a reference to Isaac's inherit right to all his father's estate. In the same way, Jesus is the "only begotten son" of God – that is, all that is the Father's is the Son's. Jesus is the ultimate Promised Child.
