# JACOB AND ESAU

#### **Story Elements**

• **TEXT**: Gen. 25:1-11; 19-34

• Setting: circa 2000 B.C.

• Main Characters: God, Jacob, and

Esau

 Plot: The twins born to Isaac and Rebekah are destined to be rivals.

Key word(s): "...the \_\_\_\_\_ shall serve the \_\_\_\_\_." (v 23)

• Climax: Genesis 25:31 And Jacob said, Sell me this day thy birthright.

### Birthright Defended

1)	(vv 1-6) Though Ishmael was Abraham's firstborn, and though Abraham had other
	sons through a concubine named Keturah <sup>1</sup> (cf. 1 Chron. 1:32), it was through Isaac
	that the covenant with God would be established. Because of this, Abraham was
	careful to protect Isaac's by sending the other sons away as soon as
	they were of age (along with a generous patrimony).

2) (vv 7-10) Abraham died in the "good old age" of \_\_\_\_\_\_ years of age. He was buried in the cave of Machpelah, where Sarah had been buried.

## Birthright Despised

- 3) (vv 19-21) Like his mother Sarah, Isaac's wife Rebekah was \_\_\_\_\_\_. But Isaac "entreated the LORD for his wife...and the LORD was entreated of him, and Rebekah his wife conceived."
- 4) (v 22) As Rebekah's pregnancy progressed, she was concerned by the extraordinary amount of commotion there was within her womb.
  - a) She prayed to God and asked, "If it be so, why am I thus?" or: "has my blessing become a ?"
  - b) (v 23) God's answer to Rebekah was an ominous prophecy: "Two \_\_\_\_\_ are in thy womb, and two manner of people shall be separated from thy bowels." Not only is this a prophecy of the the Edomites and the Israelites but also the distinction between the saved and the unsaved. Matthew Henry notes: "The seed of the woman and the seed of the serpent have been contending ever since the enmity was put between them." (cf. Gen. 3:15; Rom. 9:7-11)
- 5) (vv 24-26) The babies were born.
