Absalom's Restoration

Story Elements

- **Text**: 2 Samuel 14:1-33
- Setting: approx. 990 B.C.
- Main Characters: God, David, Absalom, Joab, and an unnamed woman of Tekoa
- Plot: Absalom is brought back to Jerusalem and feigns repentance in

order to be restored as a prince.

- Key word(s): "they shall quench my coal which is left" (v 7)
- Climax: "And the king said, Is not the hand of Joab with thee in all this?" (v 19)

Review (2 Sam. 13:1-33)

1. Because of David's sin with Bathsheba, God said to David that he would "raise up evil against thee out of thine own house." (2 Sam. 12:11) That evil began to boil over within David's family through Amnon's villainy against his half-sister Tamar, which fired the flames of hatred in the heart of Tamar's full brother Absalom. (13:22) That hatred erupted into murderous rage as Absalom orchestrated Amnon's death before fleeing to
