# Lesson 93 David Flees Jerusalem

#### Story Elements

•	Text: 2 Samuel 15:13-16:14
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- **Setting**: circa 990 B.C.
- Main Characters: God, David, Abiathar, Zadok, and Hushai
- **Plot**: As David flees Jerusalem, he is met by friends and enemies alike.
- Key word(s): "let him alone, and let

### **Review** (2 Sam. 15:1-17)

1. Absalom orchestrated a coup and deposed his father by winning the loyalty of many Hebrews and influential men. As news of Absalom's coronation in Hebron spread to Jerusalem, David willingly fled to avoid destruction of his beloved city and confrontation with his beloved son. Only ten \_\_\_\_\_\_ remained in the palace.

### Loyalists, Liars, and Loud Mouths (2 Sam. 15:17-37)

- 2. Those loyal to David fled with him. As they departed Jerusalem, they stopped at the farthest house within the city limits, formed ranks, and began their journey. (vv 17-18) The details of David's flight is a story of loyalty, bravery, and treachery.
  - (a) Ittai the Gittite (of \_\_\_\_\_) was a mercenary soldier who chose to be loyal to David instead of following Absalom. Ittai was commended for his loyalty and would later be rewarded with a generous promotion.
  - (b) Abiathar<sup>1</sup> and Zadok brought the ark in order to encourage David, but he knew God's blessing was not ultimately found in sacred furniture. He told the priests to return the ark to its place and said, "*If I shall find favour in the eyes of the LORD, he will bring me*\_\_\_\_\_." The priests were also sent back to be David's eyes and ears from within Absalom's Jerusalem. (v 28)
- 3. As David ascended the Mount of Olives, he wept and mourned.
  - (a) When he heard that Ahithophel, a wise and trusted counselor, had conspired with Absalom, David prayed, "O Lord, I pray thee, turn the counsel of Ahithophel into ." (v 31)
  - (b) The answer to David's prayers were quickly sent, for it wasn't long before Hushai the Archite met David in his journey. David instructed Hushai to align himself with

Absalom in order to contradict the counsel of Ahithophel. And so David had organized a network of \_\_\_\_\_: Hushai, Abiathar, Zadok, and their sons. (v 37)

- 4. Having passed the summit of the Mount of Olives, David was met by the gift-bearing Ziba, servant of \_\_\_\_\_\_. Ziba lied about his master (*cf* 2 Sam. 19:24-30) and told David that Mephibosheth remained in Jerusalem to reclaim the throne of his grandfather, Saul. In anger, David declared Ziba the rightful owner of Saul's estate.
- 5. The next character to meet David as he fled was Shimei, another distant relative of Saul. Shimei cursed and swore and threw rocks at David and said that all that had befallen David was God's justice against a \_\_\_\_\_ man.
