Story Elements

Text: 1 Kings 3:1-28; 2 Chronicles 1:6-13

Setting: circa 970 B.C.

Main Characters: God and Solomon

Plot: Solomon asks for wisdom.

Key word(s): “ _____ ”

Climax: *1 Kings 3:5 In Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night: and God said, Ask what I shall give thee.*

Weaknesses Revealed

- (1 Ki. 3:1) Early on in Solomon's reign he married _____ daughter. This was how nations made peace treaties long ago. As his power extended and other kings wished to make treaties with him, Solomon amassed many foreign wives - something that the kings of Israel were forbidden to do

Deuteronomy 17:17 Neither shall he multiply wives to himself, that his heart turn not away: neither shall he greatly multiply to himself silver and gold.

- (1 Ki. 3:2-3) Solomon and the people sacrificed unto the LORD in the “high places.” These places were open-air, hilltop places of worship that were leftover by the Canaanites. The Hebrews were commanded to destroy the high places, not _____ them.

Wisdom Requested

- (1 Ki. 3:3) In spite of his many failures (which will become more evident in later passages), Solomon truly did _____ the LORD.
- (1 Ki. 3:4; 2 Ch. 1:2-6) In his early years as king, Solomon went to Gibeon to make sacrifice unto the LORD at the great high place; it was also where the _____ was located.
- (1 Ki. 3:5-9) After offering a thousand sacrifices, Solomon received a vision from God at night. In the vision, God spoke to Solomon and said, “Ask what I shall give thee.” In his conversation with God, Solomon:
 - Acknowledged God's _____ to his family – especially his father David.
 - Acknowledged his own _____ to lead the great nation of Israel.
