## From Abijam to Asa

Story Elements

- **Text:** 1 Ki. 14:31-16:28; 2 Ch. 14:1-6:14
- **Setting**: circa 913 873 B.C.
- Main Characters: God, Abijam, and Asa
- **Plot**: Abijam leads Judah into sin, but his son Asa ushers in a period of revival and peace.
- **Key word**(s): "
- Climax: 2 Chr. 14:11 And Asa cried

unto the LORD his God, and said, LORD, it is nothing with thee to help, whether with many, or with them that have no power: help us, O LORD our God; for we rest on thee, and in thy name we go against this multitude. O LORD, thou art our God; let not man prevail against thee.

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1. (1 Ki. 14:31-8) Abijam was the son of Rehoboam, making him David's great-grandson. He became king following Rehoboam's death during the 18th year of Jeroboam's reign in the northern kingdom. (a) Abijam (also called ) was a wicked man, and his reign was cut short to a very brief three years. (b) (2 Ch. 13:1-22) In spite of his wickedness, Abijah did at one time display a righteous fortitude worthy of admiration. Before a battle against Jeroboam, Abijah rebuked the northern forces for their treachery against God's covenant with David and their towards the LORD himself. Abijah's southern forces won the battle and enjoyed continued regional dominance, "because they relied upon the LORD God of their fathers." (2 Ch. 13:18) 2. (1 Ki. 15:9-24) As an act of mercy, and to honor his covenant with David, God left a

  - (d) (2 Ch. 14:6-8) As a enjoyed peace in his kingdom for \_\_\_\_\_ years, during which he fortified his cities' defenses.

3.	(2 Ch. 14:9-15) During Asa's reign, Zerah the invaded Judah with one million men and 300 chariots. Asa cried unto the LORD, and the LORD gave victory unto Asa and the men of Judah.			
4.	(2 Ch. 15:1-18)) The prophet Azariah, the son of Oded, brought an encouraging word to Asa and all Judah which inspired greater loyalty to the LORD and ushered in a period of spiritual revival. This led to even more immigration of Hebrews from the north. (cf 15:9)			
5.	(2 Ch. 15:9-15) During this time of revival, Asa and the people of Judah renewed the God made with Israel.			
6.	(2 Ch. 16:1) Years later, a new king in the north, Baasha, made war with Asa. Baasha fortified, a city a few miles north of Israel, to blockade the southern flow of people to Judah.			
	(a) (2 Ch. 16:2-6) As a sought for military help by taking gold and silver out of the treasury and paying Ben-hadad of Syria to attack Baasha on his northern border. Distracted by this new development, Baasha abandoned his campaign at Ramah.			
	(b) (2 Ch. 16:7-10) Hanani the prophet rebuked Asa for trusting in Syria instead of the LORD. Asa became infuriated with the prophet and cast him into prison. Asa's remaining years would be characterized by a lack of He died of diseased feet.
