

Lesson 118 Elijah Flees from Jezebel's Wrath

Story Elements

- **Text:** 1 Kings 18:41-19:18
- Setting: circa 872 B.C., from Jezreel to Mt. Horeb
- Main Characters: God, Ahab, Jezebel, and Elijah
- **Plot**: Elijah's victory at Mt. Carmel is followed by discouragement.
- Key word(s): "and I, even I only am _____." (vv 10, 14)
- **Climax**: 1 Kings 19:12 And after the earthquake a fire; but the LORD was not in the fire: and after the fire a still small voice.

Raining, Running, and Resting

- 1. (1 Ki. 18:41) Following the amazing victory at Mt. Carmel, Elijah advises Ahab to go and eat as a token of goodwill and an act of ______ that God was pleased with the sacrifice.
- 2. (1 Ki. 18:42-44) Elijah continued in prayer atop Mt. Carmel and interceded for rain.
 - (a) He sent his servant to go and look towards the western horizon of the Mediterranean Sea and check for signs of rain.
 - (b) The servant went back and forth several times until, on the seventh time, he spotted a cloud on the horizon about the size of a ______. This cloud was the sign of a brewing storm that would bring rain.
- 3. (1 Ki.18:45-46) Ahab departed in his chariot for Jezreel, a town about 20 miles southeast of Mt. Carmel. Elijah, supernaturally strengthened by the LORD, ran before Ahab's chariot for the lengthy journey. Why do you think Elijah would do this?
- 4. (1 Ki. 19:1-4) Upon hearing that Elijah had slain the prophets of Baal, Jezebel swore that she would capture Elijah and have him killed.
 - (a) Fearing for his life, Elijah fled with his servant to the far southern city of Beer-sheba. There he left his servant and continued about a day's journey into the wilderness (about ____ miles).
 - (b) Exhausted and ______, Elijah slumped beneath a juniper tree and asked God to take his life.
- 5. (1 Ki. 19:5-8) But the LORD did not send death to Elijah. Instead, he was given food and a _____. After his second meal, the prophet was told to prepare for a forty day and night excursion to Mt. Horeb, the Mountain of God.

The Still, Small Voice

- 6. (1 Ki. 19:9-10) For forty days and nights Elijah wandered the wilderness near Mt. Horeb before finally seeking refuge in a cave in the mount (quite possibly the same cleft that ______ was hid in during his time on the mount – Exo. 33:22).
 - (a) There, the word of the LORD came to Elijah and asked, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" Elijah response was one of resignation and discouragement: "...I, even I only am left."
 - (b) (1 Ki. 19:11-14) The LORD then invited Elijah to come to the edge of the cave where he would experience God's presence in a nearly identical way that Moses did hundreds of years before – there was a rock-rending wind, a mighty earthquake, and a blazing ______. But in each phenomenon, the LORD "was not there." Following the dramatic spectacle, a still, small voice spoke to Elijah and asked a second time, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" Elijah gave the same resigned answer.
 - (c) (1 Ki. 19:15-18) The LORD responded to Elijah's discouragement by instructing to anoint three people: Hazael of Syria, Jehu of Israel, and Elisha of Abel-meholah. These three men would, in their different ways, bring God's judgment against the Omride dynasty of Israel. God also told Elijah that there remained, besides him, ______ faithful Hebrews in Israel.

- 7. Opinions differ on the meaning of the grand scene followed by a still, small voice. I believe the point is to show that when all hope seems lost, and when we expect God to intervene in the most dramatic fashion, he *is* working has *been* working quietly and ______.
- 8. What can we learn about overcoming depression from this story?
