 8. (1 Ki. 22:29-33) The campaign for Ramoth-gilead proceeded, and Ahab disguised himself as a common soldier while Jehoshaphat went to battle in his garb. (a) During combat, the Syrians were commanded to especially target, and Jehoshaphat found himself being pursued under the assumption that he was Israel's king. But the Syrians realized their mistake and withdrew from pursuing him. Jehoshaphat escaped. (b) (1 Ki. 22:34-38) Meanwhile, an archer drew a bow and shot an arrow, without, into the air. The arrow struck Ahab and killed the wicked king. His corpse was brought back to Samaria and his chariot washed out, after which the dogs came and licked his blood according to the word of Elijah. (1 Ki. 21:19)
