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## Lesson 132 Elisha and the Floating Axe Head

## **Story Elements**

Text:	2	Kings	6:1-7
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• Setting: circa 845 B.C., near Gilgal

• Main Characters: God, Elisha, and the sons of the prophets

 Plot: A lost axe head is miraculously recovered.

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• Climax: 2 Kings 6:5 But as one was felling a beam, the axe head fell into the water: and he cried, and said, Alas, master! for it was borrowed.

Building	<b>Program</b>
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- (vv 1-3) As the sons of the prophets grew in number, the need for a larger dormitory became apparent. Elisha gave his students permission to undertake the project, and he even accompanied them when they ventured to obtain \_\_\_\_\_\_ for construction.
   (vv 4-5) While chopping down trees to use the logs, the axe head slipped off of an ax and fell in the water of the Jordan River.

## **Application**

- 3. Matthew Henry points out some of the insights into this unusual school of prophets that we can learn from this story:
  - (a) The sons of the prophets were growing in \_\_\_\_\_. When the nation's spirituality grew darker, the Lord was gracious in sending more prophets to preach and pray.
  - (b) They were \_\_\_\_\_ men. They lacked the funds to purchase even basic tools. Such will be the case for many of God's servants. Though "narrow means" does not make one holy, it often accompanies those whose lives are dedicated to serving God. Matthew Henry said, "Poverty is no bar to prophecy."
  - (c) They were \_\_\_\_\_ men. They made no request for marble or cedars, but were content to fetch the lumber available in the Jordan valley. Henry said, "It becomes the sons of the prophets, who profess to look for great things in the other world, to be content with mean things in this."

Philippians 4:11 Not that I speak in respect of want: for I have learned, in whatsoever state I am, therewith to be content.
(d) They were men. The ministry sometimes attracts those who view it as an easy gig, but these sons of the prophets were men willing to work and labor.
2 Thessalonians 3:10 For even when we were with you, this we commanded you, that if any would not work, neither should he eat. 11 For we hear that there are some which walk among you disorderly, working not at all, but are busybodies. 12 Now them that are such we command and exhort by our Lord Jesus Christ, that with quietness they work, and eat their own bread.
4. Albert Barnes mentions, "Elisha had evidently great kindness of heart. He could not see a grief without wishing to it." May the Lord help us to have tender hearts and to use our gifts to help others in need.
5. This miracle is a great illustration of God's power to the unbeliever's iron heart from being lost to the muddy depths of sin and to make it useful in the LORD's work.
Ezekiel 11:19 And I will give them one heart, and I will put a new spirit within you; and I will take the stony heart out of their flesh, and will give them an heart of flesh: 20 That they may walk in my statutes, and keep mine ordinances, and do them: and they shall be my people, and I will be their God.
