

Lesson 133 Elisha and the Blood-Red Water

Story Elements

- Text: 2 Kings 3:1-27
- Setting: circa 845 B.C., in Edom and Moab
- Main Characters: God, Elisha, Jehoram, Jehoshaphat, and Mesha
- **Plot**: The Moabites rebel against Israel, inciting an invasion of their country by Israel, Judah, and Edom.
- Climax: 2 Kings 3:22 And they rose up early in the morning, and the sun shone upon the water, and the Moabites saw the water on the other side as red as blood:

Ahab Succeeded

1. The Kings of Israel and Judah thus far have been:

2. (vv 1-3) After the death of Ahab, and during the eighteenth year of Jehoshaphat's reign in Jerusalem, Jehoram became ruler of Israel. Jehoram was a wicked king whose only merit was putting away the pillar of Baal that his father had put up. Jehoram, however, continued to worship in the way of _____.

A Prophet Needed

- 3. (vv 4-9) Ahab's death was an opportunity for Mesha, the king of Moab, to rebel against Israel's regional dominance. Moab was under tribute since the reign of Omri. Jehoram requested military assistance from Jehoshaphat's kingdom to bring the Moabites back under control. Jehoshaphat wholeheartedly consented. Even the ______ joined the operation.
 - (a) (vv 9-12) After seven days of marching through the wilderness of Edom, the three armies were depleted of food and water supplies. Jehoram exclaimed, "Alas! that the LORD hath called these three kings together, to deliver them into the hand of Moab!" But Jehoshaphat wanted to inquire of a true prophet of God before giving up. The three kings sought ______ counsel.
 - (b) (vv 13-20) When in the prophet's presence, Elisha had harsh words for the wicked Jehoram: "What have I to do with thee? get thee to the prophets of thy father, and to the prophets of thy mother," and, "were it not that I regard the presence of Jehoshaphat the king of Judah, I would not look toward thee, nor see thee." But nevertheless, Elisha

sought the LORD's guidance and shared it with the three kings: God would provide not only water, but also victory. But first, they must dig ______ throughout the valley.

The Moabites Defeated

- 4. (vv 21-24) As Elisha had prophesied, water filled the ditches the army had dug. The early morning light coupled with the red sandstone terrain and the unfamiliar trenches gave the water a _____ color and caused the Moabites to assume the three kings had attacked each other and their respective armies had killed each other off. The Moabites rushed to take the spoil only to be caught off guard by three armies who were intact, refreshed, and ready to fight.
- 5. (vv 25-27) The armies of Israel, Judah, and Edom continued to smash the Moabites all the way to their capital city Kir-haraseth.
 - (a) As Mesha's defenses began to crumble, he made a last-ditch effort to appease his gods atop the city wall he sacrificed his oldest _____.
 - (b) The wrath against Israel came from the angry and desperate _____; Mesha's atrocity brought an end to the siege of Kir-haraseth.
