

Lesson 32 Joseph Interprets Pharaoh's Dream

Story Elements

•	TEXT:	Gen.	41:1-	45

Setting: circa 1730 B.C. in Egypt.

Main Characters: God, Joseph, the chief butler, and Pharaoh

Plot: Pharaoh has a terrifying dream, and Joseph is summoned to give the

interpretation.

- **Key word(s)**: "what is about to do" (v 28, similar in v 25)
- Climax: Genesis 41:25 And Joseph said unto Pharaoh, The dream of Pharaoh is one: God hath shewed Pharaoh what he is about to do.

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ľh	naraoh's Dream
1)	 (v 1) Two years after the butler's restoration, Pharaoh also had two terrifying dreams: a) (v 2) The first dream consisted of seven cows emerging from the River. These cows were noticeably healthy and fed in a lush meadow. b) (vv 3-4) Then, seven other cows emerged from the river, but these were sickly and skinny. And then the sickly cows the seven healthy cows.
2)	 (v 5) After awakening from his first nightmare, Pharaoh went back to sleep and had a second terrifying dream: a) Seven heads of wheat (KJV: ears of) sprang up from one stalk, "rank and good." b) (vv 6-7) The, seven sickly ears, blasted from an east wind, sprang up and the healthy ears.
3)	(v 8) Terrified and confused, Pharaoh was desperate for an interpretation. After summoning all his wisemen and magicians, he was disappointed to receive no help.
Jos	seph's Deliverance
4)	(vv 9-13) As he beheld the events unfolding before him, the chief butler was reminded of Joseph. He lamented, "I do remember my this day," and then recommended Joseph to Pharaoh – something he had failed to do for two years.
5)	(v 14) Joseph was fetched out of the dungeon and prepared to stand before Pharaoh.

6)	(vv 15-24) Pharaoh recounted his dreams to Joseph, but before he did Joseph said, "It is not in me: God shall give Pharaoh and answer of peace(v 16);" and then afterwards he reiterated, "hath shewed Pharaoh what he is about to do." (v 25) In all this we see Joseph's desire to glorify God in all things.
7)	 (v 25) Joseph then gave the interpretation of the dreams and how there was one purpose to the two different dreams: a) (v 26) The seven healthy cows and seven healthy ears of corn represent seven years of b) (v 27) The seven unhealthy cows and seven unhealthy ears represent seven years of

	c) (v32) The fact that two dreams were given emphasized the nearness of the events, the importance of their meaning, and the of their source.
8)	(vv 28-36) Joseph, having interpreted the meaning of the dreams, then advised what Pharaoh should do next:
	a) (v 34) He should find a man discreet (discerning) and who should be appointed to lead the famine-relief project.
	b) (v 34) This man should appoint other officers beneath him who would help to collect 1/5 th (%) of all the grain that is grown during the seven years of plenty. During the famine, the grain that was stored up will be used to feed the nation.

9)	 (vv 37-45) Pharaoh was so impressed by Joseph's interpretation and wisdom that he made him second-in-command over all of Egypt. Joseph's promotion included: a) royal signets, gold chains, royal vestures, and Pharaoh's second b) proclamation of his rank and power c) a name-change to Zaphnath-paaneah, which means " of secrets" d) marriage to, the daughter of a nobleman priest.

11)	 Christians are the light of the world to the extent that we do all things to the glory of God (1 Cor. 10:31). a) As Joseph was sure to give God the glory, so likewise we should reflect all praise and honor back to our Creator in everything we do. Matthew Henry remarks, "Great gifts appear most graceful and illustrious when those that have them use them, and take not the praise of them to themselves, but give it to God."1 b) Christ perfectly glorified the Father in all things because he was not just a reflection of God's glory, but the of it – the epitome of it.
