it v jud	PLICATION→ Perhaps God prescribed this way of finding the guilty person instead of simply telling Joshua who was so that it would impress upon Achan his need to confess before he was caught and to repent before the algorithm and the second sections. It is actions, and his family was surely involved in the deception and cover-up.
7.	 (vv 16-19) Joshua did as he was commanded, and Achan's guilt was discovered. Then (and only then) did Achan confess his guilt. a. (vv 20-21) During the battle of Jericho, Achan saw a Babylonish garment, two hundred shekels of silver (about 5 pounds), and a wedge of weighing fifty shekels (about 1 pound).
hic tre the	PLICATION→ Notice the downward spiral of sin in Achan's confession (v 21): "I saw", "I coveted", "I took", "I I" – such even was the cadence of the first sin: "And when the woman saw that the tree was good for food te to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eatand Adam and his wife hid emselves from the presence of the LORD God amongst the trees of the garden." tro yo	PLICATION→ Joshua's final word to Achan was a poetic rebuke: he called Achan a troubler and said that God ould trouble him for troubling Israel. The place where Achan was killed (Achor) means "trouble." Sin is indeed oublesome! Joshua used these very words as a warning in the previous chapter: "And ye, in any wise keep urselves from the accursed thing, lest ye make yourselves accursed, when ye take of the accursed thing, and ake the camp of Israel a curse, and trouble it." (Josh 6:18)
