

## Lesson 67 Israel Enters the Promised Land

**Story Elements** 

- Text: Joshua 3:1-5:15
- Setting: circa 1404 B.C., between Shittim and Gigal.
- Characters: God, Joshua, and an angel
- **Plot**: Israel crosses the Jordan River on dry ground, and Joshua talks with an angel.
- Key word(s) "\_\_\_\_\_" (3:4, 7, 10; 4:22, 24)
- Climax Joshua 3:15 And as they that bare the ark were come unto Jordan, and the feet of the priests that bare the ark were dipped in the brim of the water, (for Jordan overfloweth all his banks all the time of harvest).

## Crossing the Jordan

- 1. (3:1-2) Leaving Shittim, the Hebrews set out for the Jordan River where they encamped for three days.
  - a. (3:2-4) Joshua ordered the people to take their make orders from the priests who carried the ark they would know where to go by following the ark of the covenant (from a distance).
  - b. (3:5) Joshua told the people to prepare for possessing the Promised Land by \_\_\_\_\_ themselves.
- 2. (3:7) God reminded Joshua, "This day will I begin to magnify thee in the sight of all Israel, that they may know that, as I was with Moses, so I will be with thee."

APPLICATION→ Here we see the great spiritual qualities of Joshua: instead of grasping at his own elevation, he glorifies God and tells the people, "Hereby ye shall \_\_\_\_\_\_ that God is among you..." He points the people's attention back to God's promises and not to his own abilities.

3. (3:8-17) The priests that bare the ark were directed to enter the Jordan River, and as their feet hit the water, the Jordan stopped flowing and piled up on the north side, allowing the people to cross on \_\_\_\_\_ ground.

## Constructing a Memorial

- 4. (4:1-8) After all the people of Israel passed over Jordan, one chosen man from each tribe took a large stone from the riverbed and took it to the nation's campsite.
  - a. The stones were piled into an altar-like \_\_\_\_\_\_ as a reminder to succeeding generations of their God who keeps promises.
  - b. (4:9-10) Joshua also took twelve stones and made a memorial altar in the \_\_\_\_\_ of the Jordan River where the priests with the ark were standing.
- 5. (4:11-18) After the entire nation (excepting the non-combatants from Reuben, Gad, and Manasseh) crossed over the Jordan, the priests followed with the ark.
  - a. As soon as their feet touched the , the Jordan river returned to its regular course.
  - b. (5:1) When the Canaanites heard that the LORD had dried up the Jordan, and that Israel had crossed over, "their heart \_\_\_\_\_." The Amorites and Canaanites knew that the God who had brought plagues upon Egypt was about to bring wrath upon the Canaan but this time through Joshua's sword. (cf. Exo. 15:14)

## Consecrating the People

- 6. (5:2-8) Having crossed Jordan and entered the Promised Land, and before the conquest had begun, Joshua began to prepare the nation \_\_\_\_\_\_.
  - a. He commanded all the men to be circumcised (because only the older generation, now dead, had been

| C.     | circumcised – the new generation had not.) (5:9) God said to Joshua, "This day gave I rolled away the reproach of Egypt from off you." Matthew Henry explains, "Their coming safely to Canaan rolled away the reproach of Egypt, for it silenced that spiteful suggestion of the Egyptians, that for they were brought out, the wilderness had shut them in, Ex. 14:3. Their wandering so long in the wilderness confirmed the reproach, but now that they had entered Canaan in triumph that reproach was done away. When God glorifies himself in perfecting the salvation of his people he not only silences the reproach of their enemies, but rolls it upon themselves."
